LIFESAVING ACTIONS OF ENGINE 2

A swift response, medical skills and competence contributed to Firefighters saving the life of a woman from what appeared to be a drug overdose. On November 10, 2020 Firefighters on Engine 2 were dispatched on a call that a person was down not breathing at a local hotel. Within a brief time, the Fire Department Officer in charge radioed back "Engine 2 on scene." Upon arrival, Firefighters immediately took over performing CPR which was already underway.

Firefighter Kevin Cooper administered compressions as other Firefighters performed a quick patient assessment. During CPR, Firefighter Cooper determined the patient was suffering a possible drug overdose. Immediately, Firefighter Cooper gave instructions for Narcan to be administered. Narcan is a nasal spray that can treat and reverse a narcotic overdose in an emergency. FAO Kyle Cooper promptly administered Narcan, and the patient regained a viable pulse and began spontaneous breathing.

Fire Chief Corey Thornton said Engine 2's response is an indelible reminder of the lifesaving difference Firefighters make daily. "During an emergency, every moment is precious and every second counts, which can make the difference between life and death," said Chief Thornton. "Engine 2's heroics are to be commended, and each member congratulated for the important role they played individually in reviving the patient's life."

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
